Conditions of Entry

SUMMARY

This show will be conducted under the Rules of the Australian Alpaca Association as set out in the current AAA Showing Rules Manual. The competition shall be subject to the bylaws, rules, regulations and conditions as set down in the Showing Rules Manual of the Australian Alpaca Association and all decisions on the matter in connection with or arising out of the competition shall be binding on the exhibitor.

- The Chief Steward has the ultimate power to classify all entries for colour and to inspect each exhibit for disqualifying faults.
- The Colour classes may be split or merged at the discretion of the Chief Steward / Convenor, based on numbers of entries.
- All exhibitors affected by such class changes will be advised prior to the show.
- All exhibitors should read the conditions 1–4 on the entry form and ensure that they can comply with these conditions before signing the entry form, particularly noting the condition dealing with animal health.
- The registered owner of an exhibit must be a financial member of the AAA Ltd

1 Health Declaration

A separate health declaration must be signed and returned with the entry form. Failure to sign the entry form will render all alpacas of an exhibitor ineligible to be exhibited. Please note that the registered owner of an exhibit or his /her authorised agent may sign an entry form. By signing the entry form and Health Declaration Form, all exhibitors declare that to the best of their knowledge, no alpaca exhibited by them should show signs or symptoms of disease at the time of exhibition.

JOHNES DISEASE: Queensland is a BJD Protected Zone. Alpacas cannot enter Queensland unless they are from a BJD Protected Zone, BJD Free Zone, Q–Alpaca or AlpacaMap MN certified. The exhibitor, by signing the health declaration form, declares that the alpacas entered are from a herd or a property which has had no Johnes Disease and have not been in contact with infected animals or properties. Exhibitors whose entries are from a Monitored Negative (MN) or Tested Negative (TN) status herd under MAP program should include their MAP assessment number.

Exhibitors are responsible for compliance with any Government regulatory requirements for the movement of stock interstate and within Queensland. Interstate exhibitors are advised to check for updates to border crossing regulations and opening times.

Alpacas travelling interstate must comply with that State's Department of Primary Industry requirements, and must meet the Queensland Department of Primary Industries requirement regarding travel permits and waybills, particularly noting the JD status of the alpacas being transported. Alpacas travelling from interstate are required to stop at the border crossing for inspection of paperwork. On leaving Queensland, the alpacas will be required to be sprayed at the border crossing.

2 Period of Exhibition

Alpacas must be penned by 7.00am on the day of competition being 11th May 2019. All exhibitors must place their animals in the pens allotted by the Show Stewards and must not be moved or removed except by order of the Chief Steward. Animals CANNOT BE REMOVED from the grounds until the stable/s they have used have been cleaned. Entrants that disregard this rule will be charged a cleaning fee of \$20 per stable.

3 Preparation of Exhibits and Cleanliness of Stalls

Exhibitors **must** keep the stalls allotted to their animals clean, and give proper attention to their stock throughout the Show. Exhibitors must provide their own bedding straw, feed and containers for feed / water. **All Stables are to be cleaned and straw etc to be put into skip bins provided before leaving grounds.** There is a \$20 per stable penalty if this is not adhered to.

4 Advertising

Promotional material is permitted within the bounds of the standard pen height for that show. Ribbons won at any other previous show are not permitted. A handler shall be deemed to be incorrectly attired if his/her dress or the animal being led displays any information capable of being construed as advertising for any stud.

5 Companion animals and dogs

Special permission to bring a companion alpaca must be obtained from the Convenor or Chief Steward prior to submission of the entry form, otherwise no companion alpacas will be permitted. No dogs are permitted into the precinct of where Show animals are being penned or shown in the ring. Guide Dogs are exempt.

6 Inspection of Exhibits

All alpacas must be registered with the Australian Alpaca Association Ltd. and carry an approved brass tag showing the alpaca's IAR number.

No animal shall be eligible for exhibition if it is not entire (except for wethers). All genitalia shall be complete, properly formed and proportioned for normal reproduction. No wether may have any visible genetic faults or physical disfigurement.

Any animal which, in the opinion of the Chief Steward and/or veterinary surgeon, is not in a fit state to be exhibited may be rejected by them and debarred from competing in the class or classes for which it has been entered. Any decision or determination of disqualification is entirely within the discretion of the Chief Steward and Convenor.

Qualified Inspection Stewards shall perform the animal inspections at the time shown in the Show Schedule. Inspections include correct alpaca in allocated pen, correct colour, sex and age for class. Correct IAR number and correct fleece length.

If the colour of an alpaca is in doubt stewards are to assign the animal to whichever class is to be judged first, which will enable the Judge to decide in which class the animal should be allocated.

The inspection of all alpacas will commence after 2.00pm on Friday 10th May 2019 or alternatively at 7.00am on Saturday 11th May 2019.

Only the Exhibitor showing the alpaca, or his/her nominated representative shall be present in a pen while an inspection is being performed. The Steward inspecting and a person validating the information are to do so from outside the pen. Alpacas not in their allocated pens to be available for inspection at the official time may be disqualified by the Chief Steward.

Alpacas should be shorn annually. Halter class entry must have a minimum fleece length of 50 mm for Huacaya and Suri and a maximum fleece age:

Huacayas: under 14 months fleece growth at the time of showing.

Suris: First fleece under 18 months. Suri in second or subsequent fleece under 14 months fleece growth at the time of showing.

Any alpaca found to have lice or mite infestation must be removed from the showgrounds immediately along with any other alpacas present that belong to the same exhibitor.

NOTE: If there is no IAR tag present in the ear of an animal exhibit, official AAA confirmation must be provided by the owner to the Chief Steward that the ear tag has been recently lost and that a new tag has been ordered and paid for.

Exhibitors' Meeting – Chief Steward

The Chief Steward requests that all exhibitors attend a meeting in the show ring at 8.00am on competition day to be briefed on Show procedures for the day or any changes to the Catalogue.

7 Judging

A competitor may not discuss with the Judge their alpacas or proposed exhibits prior to, or during the Show judging. The Judge's decision shall be final. He/she may choose not to award a prize or prizes in a class. In the event of the Judge deciding that exhibits in any Class or Championship are not worthy of the prize, no prize or ribbon shall be awarded. All exhibitors will be supplied with an exhibit number with the age of the animal and of the animal's fleece corresponding with their entries as published in the Catalogue. All exhibitors should ensure exhibit numbers are clearly displayed on the handler's white coat/black AAA shirt while in the judging ring.

8 Correct Animal Colour Classification

An alpaca is to be shown in the appropriate colour class, when it is predominantly that colour. Any colour variations will be assessed at time of inspection. The chief steward may move animals into a different colour class upon inspection of exhibit.

Guides to colour classifications:

- **White:** constitutes a pristine, bright white fleece.
- **Light Fawn:** alpacas with a cream or off white fleece or that have light fawn on the neck or backline.
- **Grey:** a grey alpaca may be either rose grey or silver grey in light, medium and dark variants. A grey alpaca is visually "grey" from the exterior (or on opening the fleece.) A grey alpaca may or may not have other white markings.
- **Roan:** a roan is an alpaca that is brown, black, medium or dark fawn with a significant amount of easily visible white fibres consistently distributed throughout the entire fleece once the fleece is opened. From the exterior a roan may not appear to have white fibres at all, often appearing as the base colour when viewed from a distance. For halter classes a roan alpaca may or may not have other white markings. Dark alpacas that display white fibres due to age are to remain in their base colour class, as are dark alpacas with white fibres which are visible, yet not significant or consistently distributed throughout the entire fleece. Any such colour inconsistencies will be assessed at the Judge's discretion.
- **Fancy:** a fancy alpaca is to be shown in a fancy class if it has an unusual or striking distribution of two or more colours on the saddle, neck and/or legs on or above the knee. This includes pintos and tuxedo fronts where the primary colour is not grey and appaloosas including grey, as defined below.

A predominantly grey alpaca may be entered in a fancy class if it is registered with the APP prefix and displays six or more evenly sized spots throughout the blanket area.

9 Age of Alpaca

Alpacas must be entered into the correct class for their age. Age of animals is calculated from the birth date shown on the registration certificate up to Show date, i.e. 10th or 11th May 2019.

10 Wethers

Suri and Huacaya wether classes will be run at Agrotrend on Friday 10th May 2019.

11 Best of Colour

Best of Colour Classes will not be run at Agrotrend 2019.

12 Sire's Progeny Class

Sire's Progeny Class – comprises a group of two alpacas (males or females but not wethers) six months and over, not necessarily owned or bred by one exhibitor, all progeny of one sire drawn from ordinary classes (i.e. must have been entered as exhibits in the other classes of this show). Only one progeny from any one dam may be shown in each sire's progeny group.

Entries may be lodged before 12 noon on the day of the show. Only one entry fee is required per progeny group. Progeny group must display their progeny exhibit number PLUS their INITIAL exhibitor number which shows their age and age of fleece.

There must be at least 2 entries (2 alpacas per entry) in the sire's progeny class for the judging to go ahead.

13 Ribbons

Ribbons will be awarded to placings in their Classes, and sashes to all Champion and Reserve Champions, Sashes and Trophies to Supremes. RIBBON COLOURS: Blue 1st, Red 2nd, White 3rd, Yellow 4th, Green 5th, Buff 6th. Fancy and Wether Classes are not included in championships and cannot qualify for supreme championship.

14 Protests

Only an exhibitor may lodge a protest against another exhibitor or a Show Official. The protest shall be lodged in writing together with a deposit of \$50, which shall be refunded if the protest is upheld. The sole grounds for a protest shall be a breach of the Show Rules.

Protests shall be lodged with the Chief Steward or Show Convenor within one hour of alleged incident occurring. Complaints against Judges are to be put in writing, within one week of the alleged incident, addressed to the AAA Ltd. National Secretary, c/- AAA Ltd. National Office accompanied by a \$50 fee, which will be refunded in the event that the complaint is upheld.

15 Handlers Attire

In the show ring the exhibitor's uniform will include the plain white coat or one with the AAA logo. AAA logo on either the AAA black shirt, or the AAA black vest. The vest may be worn over the AAA shirt or a black shirt (with either short or long sleeves). These are worn over black trousers or a long black skirt and clean brown or black closed-in shoes. (i.e. stud colours and stud uniforms are not to be worn in the show ring). This attire may be varied by Show Convenors or special events. A handler shall be deemed to be incorrectly attired if his/her dress or the animal being led displays any information capable of being construed as advertising for any stud. All handlers showing animals must be competent in the handling of their exhibit, or removal from the ring may be requested by the Judge.

Fleeces Entries

All fleeces being exhibited (including wether fleeces) must be from alpacas registered on the IAR and be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. All exhibitors must be AAA Ltd. financial members. Fleeces are to be lodged with the Fleece Steward by post or in person by arrangement by 5pm on 26 April 2019.

Only one fleece that has been shorn in the 18 months prior to the Show may be shown from any one animal. It is recommended that fleeces be placed in bags, made of satin or similar material, or heavy duty plastic. Plastic garbage bags should be avoided.

Exhibitors, when submitting fleeces at the Show, must attach to the fleece the identification slip supplied (no names).

16 Exhibitors' Code of Conduct

1. Participants shall not engage in the following activities or behaviours while attending AAA Ltd. Endorsed shows:
 - a. Negative, obstructive or disruptive behaviour.
 - b. Abusive or foul language, rude gestures in public.
 - c. Cruelty and mistreatment of alpacas.
 - d. Lack of compliance with AAA Ltd. Showing Rules including attempts to circumvent rules or procedures.
 - e. Falsification of information required by the show including but not limited to: entry information, disclosure statements, shearing dates, dates of birth, registration certificates or ownership of alpacas.
2. Participants shall be courteous and gracious to judges, officials and fellow exhibitors at all times, regardless of class placements.
3. Shows are public events; therefore, all show participants should at all times conduct themselves in a positive, professional and courteous manner. For those entering the ring clothing should be neat and professional and be consistent with the dress code for the individual show.
4. Show participants are assumed to know all AAA Ltd. showing rules. Such individuals who voluntarily elect to participate in AAA Ltd endorsed shows do so with the understanding that they are bound by these rules and are liable to incur disciplinary action for infringement of them.
5. Breaches in any of the above may result in a protest or report being filed by the Chief Steward or other show officials with the AAA Ltd. for consideration of disciplinary action.

17 Alpaca Young Paraders Entries - Classes Open / Preliminary / Introductory and Trainer

The Young Paraders Competition (YPC) is an event in the showcase of alpaca activities, designed specifically and exclusively for young people aged from 7 to less than 22 years of age. The guidelines for the competition are outlined in the current version of the Australian Alpaca Association Young Paraders Handbook. The alpacas must be shown in a clean, well-fitted halter. A buckled halter with a detachable lead is mandatory.

The YPC incorporates two distinct areas, with three levels of experience, and provides for several age groups.

The two elements/sections of the competition have been described as:

- Showmanship
- Stockmanship

The Alpaca YPC consists of 3 divisions:

- Introductory (Non-Championship)
- Preliminary
- Open

There are three age groups/classes for each division. All ages refer to the age of the exhibitor on the day of the competition:

- Junior 7 years to under 12 years of age
- Intermediate 12 years to under 16 years of age
- Senior 16 years to under 22 years of age

Exhibitors may enter in either or both sections, however, to be eligible for the Champion of age group or Supreme Champion the exhibitor must have entered into both Showmanship and Stockmanship divisions.

Showmanship

- This section demonstrates excellence in preparation, presentation, handling of alpacas in the show ring. It enables young people the opportunity to demonstrate a sound understanding and general knowledge of alpacas, their conformation and husbandry needs.
- **Open section** - simulates the halter classes at a show.
- Evaluating competitors on their knowledge of show ring presentation and etiquette, alpaca handling and ability to show the alpaca at its best to the judge for assessment.
- **Preliminary section** – Judged in a pen where competitors will complete a hands-on assessment and show an understanding of alpaca fleece, conformation and husbandry.

Stockmanship

- The Stockmanship section offers the opportunity to demonstrate the excellence in the handling of alpacas in their normal daily management.
- This highlights through consistent training the bond that can be formed between the alpaca and its handler.
- Stockmanship is designed to simulate challenges that an alpaca and handler may face in day to day management by progressing through a series of stations/challenges' Training, teamwork and trust between the alpaca and handler are the key focus of this competition.

Introductory Division

This is a non-championship division offered to young people showing an interest in alpacas. Only Stockmanship is offered with up to 6 stations/challenges. Certificates may be awarded at this level.

Preliminary Division

This is the commencement of the Championship level in the Young Paraders Program. It introduces Showmanship to competitors, increases their education and knowledge. It incorporates hands on assessments and is aimed at young people seeking to attain a higher level of their understanding and skills within our industry on farm or in the show ring.

At this level, Stockmanship offers a higher degree of difficulty including up to 8 stations/challenges.

Open Division

This offers an increased level of competition to assist and encourage young people to elevate their learning and involvement within the alpaca industry.

This level involves Show Presentation, Stockmanship and Assessment Tasks. A steward will accompany the competitor for the duration of the assessment task. Open competitors are to complete two assessment tasks per competition to qualify for champion and or trainers awards. The Paraders Judge and AAA halter Judge will choose the tasks to be used. Each competitor is to take on the tasks individually with no discussion of the task with others i.e. (entrants, spectators, parents). Only one competitor to be doing tasks at any given time. A time limit of 10 minutes for each task will be set.

Show Presentation and etiquette will be included in this division.

Trainer classes

May be entered by Open Division pairs only. Competitors must nominate for trainers award on the entry form.

The trainer must have specifically trained and prepared the alpaca for this event as a pair. One Trainer award will be awarded per show taken from all age groups in open section.

The Trainers award will only be awarded if their score is within 90% of the top overall score (Showmanship and Stockmanship) on the day of competition. Task scores are not included here.

Master Trainer State Awards

The accumulation of scores from Trainers awards from each event will be accumulated over the course of the year (National to National) and will be combined with information received from journals. Journal explanation is on the AAA Website outlined in the current version of the Australian Alpaca Association Young Paraders Handbook.

Attire

Dress code for the show needs to be professional with Stockmanship inspired by the Australian Stockman.

It is encouraged to wear Australian Stockmanship wear.

Minimum standard of safe clothing compulsory for all Paraders events e.g. closed shoes, long trousers and shirts, minimal /no loose jewellery and hair tidy/up.

Open and Preliminary

- **Shirts** - Club, School, State or AAA Full School Uniforms Shirts collared with long sleeves and long pants.
- **Footwear** - Black or Brown polished boots. Western boots to be worn inside of pants, not worn over pants.
- **Hats** - Hats are to be Australian country i.e. Akubra style.
- **Belts** - Belts and buckles to be plain.
- **Showmanship** - Black dress pants / trousers only.
- **Stockmanship** - Moleskins, Black Pants or Tidy jeans.

Neat rural / country smart dress codes will draw maximum points including: hat, boots, belt, jeans / moleskins, collared long sleeve shirt or full school uniform.

Event Timelines

As event will invariably at times run outside of the scheduled time line this needs to be an important consideration for all entrants prior to entry.

It is the responsibility of the competitor to know when their class commences.

Marshalling

- Oldest age group in Open will start followed by oldest age group in Preliminary. Each age group will follow in the same manner.
- It is up to Competitors to know when they are needed in the ring.

Animals used for Young Paraders Competition

- Entire and wether quality animals will be accepted.
- Alpacas may be shared by prearrangement in Introductory, Preliminary and Open Divisions, but an alpaca may be used no more than twice in any one class in their age group.
- However, there needs to be a minimum of four entries in any one class for an alpaca to be used twice.

The Australian Alpaca Youth Education Events provides the guidelines for this competition. All participant's / mentor breeders can find this on the AAA Ltd Website / Resource Centre.

18 Championship Ribbons

Champion of age (Preliminary and Open) will be awarded to the highest combined score of the day at each show per division.

Champions in subsequent age groups will be awarded to the highest scorer within each age on a percentage basis.
Champions 80% i.e. top combined score of the day = 150 points
Subsequent Champion must attain a minimum of 120 points.

Reserve Champion will be awarded to those competitors whose scores fall within 70% of the top champion score for the day.
I.e. Top score = 120 points Subsequent Reserves must attain no less than 84 points

19 Young Judging

Competitions take place under show conditions.

Evaluation is carried out by an AAA Ltd Accredited Judge (the over judge). There are two sections visual and oral, visual takes place first.

One class of four animals is judged by competitors.

The total possible score is 150 points, made up of 50 points for correct placement of the four animals; (assessment taken from the Normal Scale) 50 points for the visual and 50 points for oral presentation.

Visual

- Competitors are allowed ten minutes to judge the four animals and to complete their placing card.
- The number of competitors required to present oral judgements is left to the discretion of the Chief Steward
- Where the number of competitors is large, it may be appropriate to select the top eight visual class scorers.
- Competitors are scored on handling, general competence, ringcraft, presentation and dress.

Oral

Competitors are scored on accuracy of observation, ability to compare animals and speaking ability.

- Competitors are allowed three minutes to inform the over judge of the reasons for their placing.
