

Regulations and Sections

General

- 1. A **Craft Exhibit Description Ticket** must be attached to each item entered. Otherwise, the item will be displayed, but not judged. This ticket must have no identifying words, marks, names etc. of the exhibitor, ONLY a full description of the materials and method used. Ticket is attached to exhibit for the judge's reference, so include any relevant details or story of the making.
- 2. A **Craft Exhibitor Form** must be attached to each article entered. This form shows the section and class entered and the exhibitors details.
- 3. To facilitate a safe and timely return of your entry after the conclusion of the show, when you forward your entry, please include a suitable postage paid, self-addressed envelope that will be used to return your entry to you.
- 4. Exhibits will be available for collection after the conclusion of the Show on Sunday 10th August.
- 5. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 6. Members and non-members of the AAA are invited to exhibit.
- 7. Exhibits must have been completed within the last 12 months and not shown at a previous AAA National Show.
- 8. All items which require the use of yarn must have a sample of the yarn and yarn label attached. If surplus yarn is to be kept for another project, a photocopy of yarn label is sufficient.
- 9. For hand spun, details including yarn weight and composition. (eg 4ply, 8ply, WPI) and sample of fibre must be attached. Exhibits received without yarn samples will be displayed but not judged.
- 10. Most Successful Exhibitor will be awarded on a points system, 1st = 4 points, 2nd = 3 points, $3^{rd} = 2$ point, H/C 1 points. If there is a tie, then broad ribbons will be considered.





SECTION 1: Hand Spinning

Please read conditions for presentation, judging criteria and definitions.

Conditions

- 1. This section will judge the spinning of alpaca and alpaca blends.
- 2. A staple of original fibre(s) for Class CS1 CS9, or sample of tops, sliver etc for Class CS10 CS17, must be attached to all exhibits.
- 3. State the intended purpose of yarn and Spinning System employed. eg: wheel, spindle, e-spinner etc
- 4. Please attach the **Craft Exhibit Description Ticket** and the **Craft Exhibitor Form** using a safety pin or bulb pin.
- 5. Skeins to be presented as a single skein.
- 6. Exhibits that are the incorrect weight will be displayed but not judged.
- 7. In presentation, make sure the skein can be examined, so ensure it has sufficient ties.
- 8. Classes CS1, CS2, CS3, CS4, CS5, CS6 Where WPI is applicable, exhibitors MUST include a <u>one meter</u> <u>length</u> of the yarn separate to the skein, to enable the judge to check WPI.

9. Judging will be based on:

- Fleece and yarn for end use
- Twist in single and ply
- Evenness of spin and ply (Does not apply to CS8 Novelty yarn).
- Washing and presentation
- CS8 Novelty yarn Creativity, Unique texture and visual interest

Class CS1

Specimen of fine hand spun yarn (lace weight) in suri alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 18 wraps per inch or more. State intended purpose.

Class CS2

Specimen of fine hand spun yarn (lace weight) in huacaya alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 18 wraps per inch or more. State intended purpose.

Class CS3

Specimen of hand spun yarn (medium weight) in suri alpaca, plied. Not less than 50 grams. Between 11 and 17 wraps per inch.. State intended purpose.

Class CS4

Specimen of hand spun yarn (medium weight) in huacaya alpaca, plied, .not less than 50 grams. Between 11 and 17 wraps per inch. State intended purpose.

Class CS5

Specimen of hand spun yarn (bulky weight) in suri alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 10 wraps per inch or less. State intended purpose.

Class CS6

Specimen of hand spun yarn, (bulky weight) in huacaya alpaca plied, not less than 50 grams. 10 wraps per inch or less. State intended purpose.

Class CS7

Specimen of hand spun plied alpaca blend (see definition). Not less than 50 grams. Wraps per inch open. State blend and purpose

Class CS8

Specimen of hand spun alpaca or alpaca blend *(see definition)* <u>novelty yarn</u> *(see definition)*. Can be dyed or overdyed. The yarn can be plied or a single strand with the twist set (see definition). Not less than 50 grams. Wraps per inch open. State purpose and technique.

Class CS9 - NOVICE - An individual with less than 12 months experience Spinning

Specimen of alpaca or alpaca blend (see definition), hand spun by a novice (see definition). Not less than 50 grams. Wraps per inch open.

Specimen of fine hand spun yarn (lace weight) in suri alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 18 wraps per inch or more. State intended purpose.

Class CS11

Specimen of fine hand spun yarn (lace weight) in huacaya alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 18 wraps per inch or more. State intended purpose.

Class CS12

Specimen of hand spun yarn (medium weight) in suri alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. Between 11 and 17 wraps per inch. State intended purpose.

Class CS13

Specimen of hand spun yarn (medium weight) in huacaya alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. Between 11 and 17 wraps per inch. State intended purpose.

Class CS14

Specimen of hand spun yarn, (bulky weight) in suri alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 10 wraps per inch or less. State intended purpose.

Class CS15

Specimen of hand spun yarn, (bulky weight) in huacaya alpaca, plied, not less than 50 grams. 10 wraps per inch or less. State intended purpose.

Class CS16

Specimen of hand spun plied alpaca blend (see definition). Not less than 50 grams. Wraps per inch open. State blend and purpose.

Class CS17

Specimen of hand spun alpaca or alpaca blend *(see definition)* <u>novelty yarn</u> *(see definition).,* can be dyed or over dyed. The yarn can be plied or a single strand with the twist set (*see definition*). Not less than 50 grams. Wraps per inch open. State purpose and technique.

Class CS18 - NOVICE - An individual with less than 12 months experience Spinning

Specimen of alpaca or alpaca blend (see definition), hand spun by a novice (see definition). Not less than 50 grams. Wraps per inch open.

SECTION 2: Hand Weaving

Please read conditions for presentation, judging criteria and definitions.

Conditions

- 1. When using hand spun, a staple of the original fibre is to be attached. In the case of commercial yarn a sample of the yarn and yarn label is to be attached.
 - If surplus yarn to be kept for another project, a photocopy of yarn label is sufficient
- 2. All distinguishing marks or labels to be removed or covered.
- 3. Please attach the **Craft Exhibitor Form** and the **Craft Exhibit Description Ticket** using a safety pin or bulb pin.
- 4. Information about the entry as to purpose/application of design, weaving technique, and type of loom used. eg: floor, table, number of shafts, rigid heddle, pin, Saori etc and if any additional 'shafts' used eg. Pick-up Stick etc
- 5. Judging will be based on:
 - Suitability of materials and patterns to classification.
 - Regularity of weave, set, beat and selvages.
 - Quality of make-up and finish of garment or article
 - Purpose/application of design and weaving technique.

3. Judging based on:

- Suitability of yarn for the project
- Stitch evenness and tension of knitted fabric
- Complexity and precision of technique
- Finishing and presentation

- 3. Please attach the **Craft Exhibitor Form** and the **Craft Exhibit Description Ticket** using a safety pin or bulb pin.
- 4. Seams may be hand sewn or linked, but not over locked or machined.
- 5. State the make and model of machine used.
- 6. Judging based on:
 - Choice of yarn for pattern use.
 - Evenness of knitted fabric.
 - Evenness and quality of make-up and finish of garment or article.
 - Presentation.

- 3 Embellishments using other fibres allowed. (see definition)
- 4. Judging will be based on:
 - Evenness of fabric (where applicable)
 - Originality. i.e. artistic impression and impact
 - Quality of make-up and finish of exhibit
 - Execution, Technique and Craftsmanship

This category focuses on creativity covering an exhibit that encompasses multiple techniques, weaving, knitting, crocheting, felting. (This does <u>not</u> include spinning). Must contain at least 50% alpaca (huacaya and/or suri).

Conditions

- 1. Attach samples of fibres and materials used.
- Please attach the Craft Exhibitor Form and the Craft Exhibit Description Ticket using a safety pin or bulb pin.
- 3. Judging will be based on:
 - Originality and artistic impression, unique style
 - Creativity of design
 - Execution and presentation
 - Complexity and visual impact

Class CMT1

Garment or article created by a <u>team</u> [*two or more people*], e.g., crocheter, knitter, weaver, felter, using at least 50% alpaca, (huacaya and/or suri). Emphasis in this class is on originality, creativity, and techniques.

Class CMT2

Exhibit created by an <u>individual</u>, using at least 50% alpaca fibre (huacaya and/or suri). Emphasis in this class is on originality, creativity, and techniques.

Definitions

ALPACA:

The natural fibre of the alpaca, which is a South American camelid. There are two types of fleece. The suri has a fleece that forms long lustrous locks, and the huacaya which forms fleece in bundles of crimpy soft fibre.

<u>ALPACA BLENDS</u>: This show is encouraging the use of alpaca and as such, blends must contain at least 50% alpaca – huacaya and/or suri. Please state percentage of alpaca used.

BLENDS:

These can be fibres that are used in conjunction with alpaca to create different effects with tops and yarn. These may include silk, cashmere (cashmere goat), wool (sheep), mohair (angora goat), bamboo, tencel, nylon glitz, thrums (loom waste) or silk noils.

<u>EMBELLISHMENTS</u>: These can be used in small quantities to enhance an article. These include: buttons, laces, zips, metallic yarns, beads, ribbons, knitting stitch embroidery etc.

LACE:

Lace is a style of knitting/ crocheting characterised by stable 'holes' in the fabric arranged with consideration or aesthetics.

NOVELTY YARN:

A novelty yarn can also be described as an <u>art yarn</u>. It is a type of yarn that is specially designed to create unique textures, colours, pattern and effects in knitted or woven fabrics, making it stand out from traditional yarns. These yarns are often characterized by irregularities such as slubs (thicker sections), loops, boucle, beehive or different thicknesses along the strand. It must contain at least 50% Alpaca and can also include added elements like metallic threads, beads, or fibres of varying materials to produce a distinctive appearance. Please state the percentage of alpaca in the yarn.

W.P.I. Wraps per inch. Spinning.

Wraps per inch is the number of strands (either singles or plied yarn) that can be laid next to each other in an inch (2.5cm). Not stretched, not tight, each wrap just touching the wrap before and after. This will give you a standard measurement for how thick your yarn is.

Completed Yarn (either plied or single) must be, washed and dried. A one meter sample of exhibit yarn must be included with entry for judge to check WPI.

TWIST SET

Setting the twist, means washing and drying.

SAMPLE:

Yarn/fibre samples must be attached to the item in a sealed plastic bag, with any labels (ball bands, mill labels etc.)

ARTICLE:

Articles are knee rugs, blankets, scarves, shawls or wraps, socks, beanies, hats, bags, jewellery. Article extends to non wearable items such as toys, table runners, tea cosy, vessel. Where a class calls for an article, this means one (1) article only, e.g., 1 scarf, 1 pair of socks.

GARMENT:

A garment is an article that can be fitted onto the body eg. dress, skirt, jacket, jumper, cardigan, vest.

WET FELTING:

Wet felting is a technique with multiple steps involving, water, soap, pressure, agitation and a change of pH level to natural fibres to produce a fabric.

NUNO FELTING:

Nuno felting uses the wet felting technique. Wool fibres are incorporated into an open weave fabric such as cotton, silk, gauze or muslin, to create a lightweight felt. The term 'nuno' lends itself from the Japanese term meaning 'cloth'.

NEEDLE FELTING

Needle felting known as dry felting is a craft that involves sculpting shapes and figures using wool and special felting needle which has tiny barbs along the needle that push the wool fibres into more wool to secure them in place.

Needle felting can create 3 dimensional projects or a flat surface project

- <u>2D</u> Flat work wall hanging, picture etc (felted, knitted, crochet)
 Eg. A picture of an alpacas head, although the head may be built up above the flat surface if you cannot see the back of the alpacas head, this is 2 dimensional.
- 3D Sculpture Animal, toys, piece of fruit, vegetable, vessel (vase, bowl etc) (felted, Knitted, crochet) A Sculpture that can be viewed 360 deg, (in front and behind) eg. A sculptured alpaca that stands up and can be viewed from top, bottom, back and front, this is 3 dimensional.

NOVICE:

A craft person with less than 12 months experience in the craft specified by the class.
